I have always contended that schools don't change lives. God changes lives and transforms hearts. With equal passion and conviction, I would claim that there are very few educational environments as committed to biblical worldview development as Prestonwood Christian Academy. 
Dr. Miranda, PCA's Upper School Guidance & College Placement Director, and I recently gathered with several

Harvard, Columbia, King's, and Marymount Manhattan. I was enthralled with one student's accounts of her ethics class with world-renowned professor and ethicist Dr. Peter Singer. If you want to get your blood pumping just read some of Dr. Singer's views on the "sanctity of life." For example, he reasons that where a baby has Down's syndrome (and in other instances of "life that has begun very badly") parents should be allowed to kill the child within 28 days after birth. Singer states that human babies are not persons. Hence their lives would seem to be no more worthy of protection than the life of a fetus". Unfortunately, Dr. Singer's ideology is shaping a generation of thinkers, leaders and marketplace values. But, as powerful as Dr. Singer is, sitting in his classroom is a young lady whose worldview is grounded on biblically-based convictions. That student is reasoning in a marketplace that desperately needs to witness an authentic Christian mind whose worldview impacts all areas of her life.

We can produce students with the spiritual depth needed to enter our pluralistic society and not fall prey to empty philosophies, but enter the marketplace God has called them to with confidence, purpose and an eternal perspective. Jesus Christ must be our model; *Ad Majorem Dei Gloriam* must remain our perspective; and, wisdom and discernment producing rigor in every area of our school must be our practice. The PCA Initiatives are built upon five Priorities that reflect a critical component in PCA's institutional advancement. This creates a path for moving PCA forward while remaining committed to our mission and Kingdom Education. Already, we are experiencing initial progress.

#### INVESTING IN FACULTY

 Ensure compensation and benefit programs exceed area benchmarks

It's been exciting to see progress made in this initiative through our continued efforts and strategic planning relating to area benchmarks.

Great strides have been made to provide competitive compensation and benefit packages for our faculty as well as a training plan committed to philosophical and instructional excellence. A renewed commitment has been made to ensure achievement of this initiative for years to come.

#### **INVESTING IN PROGRAMS**

- Deploy a comprehensive, campus-wide technology improvement strategy
- Implement a distance learning strategy to extend our curriculum beyond our campus
- Expand our World Impact Program and it's cornerstone offering, Minimester
- Enhance PCA's curriculum offerings to maximize student potential

The Technology Improvement Plan has been adopted with funding strategies being considered. An anonymous, leadership gift has been made to help advance this key strategy. PCAplus has since been unveiled, extending PCA beyond our campus borders through online courses and other distance learning strategies. Minimester 2010 has been expanded and additional fundraising strategies have been advanced to assist students in funding their short-term mission opportunity. And for the first time, each of Minimester's mission-focused offerings is on wait-list; we are eager to see what God has in store for students in Minimester 2010. Strategies are being developed to expand and enhance PCA's curriculum offerings including the Center for Media Excellence, with its new video internship program

and soon-to-be enhanced facilities in the Upper School. Enhancements have also been made in the core areas of Math and English, and students are already seeing the fruit of these enrichments.

## INVESTING IN FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

 Extend financial assistance to families who would otherwise not be able to afford a private Christian education, or who are experiencing a temporary hardship, or who simply are underprivileged has been primarily funded through the annual budgeting process



It's encouraging to see great progress in our financial assistance program through the successful shared vision of the Prestonwood Foundation and PCA. The Zig Ziglar Servant Leadership Award was established with the purpose of honoring the legacy of Zig Ziglar by annually naming a recipient who embodies the very essence of his servant leadership.

#### **INVESTING IN FACILITIES**

- Identify and advance ancillary capital projects to areas such as arts and athletics
- Identify and advance small capital improvements to existing areas of our campus

Advancement of these initiatives is a priority and the PCA community may see or begin to see improvements to areas including enhanced media facilities in the Upper School.




### Media Center Expansion






## campus ministry team expands efforts

## live the code



## Projecting Academic Excellence: A Legacy of Learning





FOR PRESTONWOOD CHRISTIAN ACADEMY, ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE FOR EACH STUDENT AT **EVERY GRADE LEVEL IS PARAMOUNT** to helping

students be successful at PCA and beyond. Academic excellence, wrapped across curriculum with a Kingdom Education philosophy providing synergy between school, home and church, is one of PCA's strongest goals. "Strive for academic excellence" is an important aspect to the institution and can be found in PCA's mission statement. That driving mission is posted prominently for all to see on the wall of the PCA Leadership Center.

"In pursuit of excellence in education, the mission of Prestonwood Christian Academy is: To assist Christian parents by helping equip students to embrace biblical truth, strive for academic excellence, and model Christ-like leadership to influence their homes, churches and communities for Christ."

MAKING IT A REALITY. PCA faculty works with nearly 1,500 students at varying age levels and developmental stages from grades Pre K3 to 12 during the school year to make excellence through academic rigor a reality. With so many subjects, students and their varying stages, how does PCA faculty help develop student success?

According to Senior Director of Curriculum & Instruction Gwen Hobbs, the planning and discussion of curriculum for all grades happens through 10 vertical teams in the subjects of Bible, English, math, science, history, foreign language, technology/media, physical education, fine arts and competitions. These teams are composed of teachers from every grade and it is unusual for most private schools.

It's a very intentional process, and it is an essential part of creating a legacy of learning in families by linking today's

lesson in math Pre-K3 student Colby Apple learned to the lesson in math big brother and Junior Creighton Apple learned that same day.

"PCA has specific objectives and standards written for every course, more than 200 courses school-wide so there is an accountability system designed around our objectives," said Mrs. Hobbs. "Another key to PCA faculty helping our students succeed is to provide them with training. PCA's staff institute training module is a deliberate training plan for our teachers and staff."

Assistant Head of School over Academics Dana Epperson points to the fact that surrounding every academic effort at PCA is an over-arching factor that is highly unusual from most schools.

"The integration of biblical principles into curricular content using the biblical worldview integration planner is very unique to PCA," said Mrs. Epperson. "Very few schools in our area and beyond are this deliberate in integrating the principles rooted in God's Word into curricular lessons."

PCA reaches a broad spectrum of learners and specializes in helping each student find academic success. This feature of our Academy makes it extremely valuable to parents, including former teacher and PCA parent Reagan Waddell.

"The academic program at PCA was designed with a purpose," said Mrs. Waddell. "Its academic core values and vision of a Kingdom Education make PCA's approach to the instruction of our children distinctive. The sequential order of learning allows students in all grades to build upon and reinforce concepts taught while providing opportunities for enrichment."

Academic excellence is put into practice in all grades. Last year, PCA Upper School students were more than 50 percent higher above the national average in their Advanced Placement® (AP) exam pass rate. Passing AP

exams allows Upper School students to gain college credit before entering college. Additionally, last year PCA saw 22 students earn the recognition of AP Scholars, with alumnus Christopher Silverberg achieving the highest possible score on all eight possible exams.

One element of PCA instruction that is highly-emphasized is rigor in mathematics at all grade-levels. PCA students are continuing to score higher than the national average in mathematics testing. Lower School students scored over 88 percent higher than other students and Middle School students scored over 84 percent. Not to mention the average pass rate for PCA AP students is a staggering 93 percent which is well above the national average.

PCA understands the value of strong writing and communications skills. Emphasis on writing across the curriculum through PCA's Collins Thinking and Writing Program is essential to helping teachers and students use common vocabulary to develop strong communications skills. PCA parents find that students in grades 1-12 learn research skills and develop a research plan. Additionally, last year PCA was the only school to have two student essays published in the annual, nationally-acclaimed FISKE Real College Essays That Work book (see page 9 for the story).

#### **OPPORTUNITIES FOR SUCCESS REACH EVERY**

**STUDENT.** PCA is unique in its ability to provide programs to assist students at a wide variety of learning levels. One such program is PCA's Learning Lab, led by Cheryl Burns, that touches more than 100 students in each division -Lower, Middle and Upper Schools. PCA's learning lab is staffed by five full-time teachers who assist students and also observe students to determine if the Learning Lab is needed for each.

The Learning Lab provides ongoing support and training for classroom teachers and provides ongoing communications between home and school, while monitoring student academic progress.

### strive - to make strenuous efforts toward any goal; to strive for success

According to teachers representing all divisions, PCA's Learning Lab is an important aspect of their daily instruction.

"I have seen a rise in self-confidence with my students because they are able to learn in the best way that suits them," said Carol Ferguson, first grade teacher. "The puzzle pieces fit together and their frustration level is gone."

According to Susan Ladd, Upper School chemistry teacher, the Learning Lab allows students the opportunity to revisit and review skills in a smaller, less threatening environment. Mrs. Ladd believes that student learning styles are affirmed and celebrated as our staff assists students and discovers instructional techniques that help them be successful in the classroom.

#### SPECIAL PROGRAMS MEASURE

**UP.** Truly distinctive to PCA are the many Kingdom Education-focused programs surrounding our students. PCA offers unique staff, such as a Campus Minister, Worldview Director and Director of Diversity who each bring their gifts to accompany student academics. Chapel, Bible and cultural apologetics courses serve to strengthen educational experiences from a spiritual perspective and encourage personal relationships with Jesus Christ. Through these programs that complement academics, students learn to have a

biblical worldview on their culture and the issues of not only their times, but of the future. Programs such as the Student Leadership Institute, Lions Scholar Program, World Impact Day and Minimester mission trips help students take their

academic training into the real world to serve others. Athletics, fine arts and clubs and competitions led by professionals in their fields help round out the PCA student experience.

## Why PCA?

When there are many private Christian schools to choose from, some ask how Prestonwood Christian Academy distinguishes itself from the rest. Is it in the world of academia? Or is the difference only in the spiritual?

PCA has distinguishing factors in the areas below:



#### SPIRITUALLY

- **Biblical Worldview Integration:** The Truths of God's Holy Word are woven into every class at every level at PCA, not just in chapel and Bible class.
- Worship Opportunities: Students in Pre-Kindergarten 3 through grade 12 experience a weekly chapel as well as five All School Worship services throughout the year.
- Character Training: PCA puts an emphasis on character training, the PCA Code of Honor, respect and servant leadership.
- Mission Connection: Students in the Lower School, Middle School and Upper School are involved in mission trips and service projects. Older students serve as mentors and inspirations for the younger students through the adopt-an-athlete program, reading buddies, and mission partner programs.
- New Christ Followers: Prestonwood Christian Academy celebrated 144 student and 45 parent salvations during the 2008-09 school year.

#### STUDENT-FOCUSED

- Assistant Teachers: Every Pre-Kindergarten 3 through Kindergarten class has a teacher's assistant. Grades 1 through 4 have grade level assistants increasing the amount of individual attention each student receives.
- Balance: PCA provides balance for the student and the family. Attention to homework loads and homework relevancy coupled with individual attention and tutoring provided by the faculty plus a block schedule result in academic excellence without placing undue stress on students or their families.
- Student-Mandated: Teachers and administration are able to focus on each student's needs rather than relying on the results of a state-mandated test.
- Kingdom Education: PCA is founded on the philosophy of Kingdom Education, which focuses on the partnership between the home, school and church. This philosophy sets PCA apart as a Biblical Worldview training model for the next generation.
- Advisory Groups: Individual nurturing takes place in small group settings. Lower School students benefit from programs designed by the Lower School Counselor to meet their needs. Sixth grade boys have Start Strong: Finish Strong, the fifth and sixth grade girls have the Fine China Sisterhood and Fine China Society. Students in grades 7 through 12 have advisory groups.
- **Tuition Assistance:** Tuition assistance is based on qualified needs and is distributed as available from year to year.

  Approximately 20 percent of PCA students receive tuition assistance with an average grant of \$5,000.

#### ACADEMICALLY

- Writing Across the Curriculum: The Collins Thinking and Writing Program helps teachers and students use common vocabulary as well as levels of expectations on writing across the curriculum, and writing in every course whether it is music, science or English. The byproduct is to develop good communication skills while emphasizing higher order thinking processes.
- Developed Research Plan: Students in grades 1 through 12 are learning research skills that are preparing them for college.
- Spectrum of Learners: We reach many levels of learners from those with learning differences in the Learning Lab to those gifted in the Advanced Placement® courses. In addition, students are offered the option of demonstrating mastery in a variety of ways rather than only through written tests.
- **Emphasis on Western Civilization:** PCA teaches the foundation of our society and the Christian faith.
- Lower School Enrichment Courses: Students in Pre-Kindergarten 3 through grade 4 are exposed to Spanish, art, technology, music, P.E. and library.
- Duke Talent Search: Nearly 65 percent of PCA seventh graders qualified for the Duke Talent Search.
- AP® Test Scores: PCA Upper School students have a 92 percent Advanced Placement exam pass rate versus the national average of 34 percent. Advanced Placement classes are nationally-recognized, college-level courses. Highly qualified Upper School students gain college credit and recognition in the college admission process when they pass each AP course exam.
- Scholarships: PCA graduates have accumulated over \$12 million dollars in college scholarships over the past three years.
- FISKE Book Publishing: PCA was the only school with more than one student to have their essay published in the annual FISKE Real College Essays That Work book.
- AP® Scholar Awards: Twenty-two PCA students have earned recognition as AP Scholars. Only 18 percent of the nearly 1.7 million students worldwide who took AP Exams performed at the sufficiently high level to earn an AP Scholar Award. One PCA student, now attending Columbia University, achieved the highest possible score of five on all eight AP exams.
- Alumni Nationwide: Nearly 100 percent of PCA students have matriculated to over 135 colleges and universities, including some of the most prestigious fine arts and engineering colleges and universities.
- **Socratic Method:** PCA is continuing to train teachers on how to integrate higher order thinking skills throughout the curriculum. One means is through Socratic Seminars where students learn to clearly express their opinions with supporting evidence from a text; to question or defend the accuracy of what they read; to challenge the ideas of the author by noting bias, distortion, or lack of information; to contrast the accuracy of one text with other sources to form defensible critiques, and to make solid judgments about a text derived from interpretation and inferential information.

#### ATHLETICALLY

- Championships: Since 2000, PCA athletic teams have brought home 22 district titles, 12 regional titles, five state titles, four state finalist titles and five national championships.
- **Sports:** Participation in sports begins in seventh grade. Fifteen types of sports are offered school-wide and there are currently 58 boys and girls PCA teams in Middle School and Upper School combined.
- Participation: Over 85 percent of Upper School students are active in athletics.
- PCA at the College-Level: PCA currently has nearly 20 athletes competing at the college level in numerous athletic programs across the country. Two PCA alumni competed against one another in the recent NCAA Men's College Baseball World Series.
- PCA Athletes Gain National Attention: PCA currently has two basketball athletes who are highly sought-after by the country's top university basketball programs and are considered among the highest ranked players in the nation.

#### ARTISTICALLY

- **Musical Productions:** The Fine Arts department produces one musical a year. A *Dallas Morning News* reporter wrote of the 2009 spring musical 42<sup>nd</sup> Street, "I can honestly say that I have never been to a better high school production."
- **Drama Productions:** The Fine Arts department produces one drama production a year. The fall 2008 production of *Little Women* was selected as a "show stopper" state winner by the *USA Today Weekend Magazine*.
- Middle School Drama: The drama department recently produced their first Middle School production, Joseph and the Technicolor Coat.
- **Participation:** Over 65 percent of Upper School students are involved in fine arts.
- Honor Choir: PCA provides Lower School and Middle School students an opportunity to participate and compete in Honor Choir.

#### DISTINCTIVELY

- Unique Staff: PCA has a number of unique staff positions that reflect its emphasis on Biblical Worldview training:
  - Full-time Campus Minister leads a Campus Ministry Team.
  - Full-time Director of Curriculum vertically aligns every piece of curriculum from Pre-Kindergarten 3 through grade 12.
  - Full-time Worldview Director provides direction on culturally-relevant decisions students and parents face on a day-to-day basis.
- Director of Diversity leads the initiative, based on the definition of biblical diversity: gender, race, age, ability (physical challenges and individual talents), ethnicity (culture) and economic status.
- Student Leadership Institute: Students who participate in Student Leadership Institute (SLi) are given the opportunity to engage the culture through training, debate, event participation, being a servant leader, and being actively involved in a local church body. One student took her training from SLi and used it to plan and execute a student mission trip to the Amazon.
- **Lions Scholar:** The Lions Scholar program (LSP) equips and develops Middle School and Upper School students to enter prestigious universities to attain positions of influence in leadership, academics and places of cultural impact for the purpose of engaging the culture for Christ.
- **Learning Lab:** The PCA Learning Lab supports students with learning differences so that they can experience success in the regular academic schedule and be prepared to succeed in college.
- **Kingdom Parent Institute:** Through Kingdom Parent Institute (KPi), parents are provided with classes, a family mission trip, a family conference and biblically-based materials to assist in being a Kingdom parent. Parents and students are both afforded the opportunity to attend the annual Biblical Worldview Institute featuring speakers and topics applicable to the culture.
- World Impact Day: World Impact is a school-wide program focused on missions and service efforts. The PCA family is given the opportunity to pray for the student missionaries, commission them for their trips and offer financial support.
- Minimester: Middle School and Upper School students are afforded a spring trip that exposes them to opportunities in mission work, internships, academic growth and fine arts. There are six international and over 10 local and national trips available. Lower School students participate by adopting mission trips to support through prayers and supplies.
- **Graduation Goal:** In addition to providing a strong academic foundation, one of PCA's goals is for a graduating student to be able to define their faith and defend their faith. PCA alumni comment frequently at how surprised they are when they try to have a serious discussion with their college peers saying, "They have not had the training to know what they believe, much less how to **define** or **defend** a belief."
- Clubs: Upper School students have the opportunity to participate in many clubs including: the Fury (school spirit organization), Chess Club, Diverge (Diversity club), International Thespian Society, National Honors Society, Green Team (Recycle club), Student Government Association, Spanish Club and Youthquest.
- **Competitions:** Many competitions are provided as opportunities for students to take what they've learned and put it into practice. PCA competitions include: Destination Imagination, Math Olympics, Spelling Bee, Speech Meet, "Stand up and Be Heard," Future Problem Solvers, National Spanish Exam, Math Challenge, Stock Market Game, TAPPS Academic Competitions, as well as many Fine Arts and Athletic competitions.

#### PCA's Program Grows as Student Diversity Increases to 20 Percent

Imagine you are in a foreign country. What language are they speaking? What type of food are they eating? Where is a safe place to stay? Is there a Wal-Mart on any corner? You are thrown into an environment you don't know; the language, clothes, etiquette and traditions all appear to be completely radical from what you know and who you are. How would you adjust and thrive? More importantly, what if you were looking for hope and didn't know where to find it?

That is the scenario each international student faces when they step foot on the campus of Prestonwood Christian Academy in Plano, Texas, the United States of America. Their world changes in every way. It's one thing to be away from your friends and people you know but what's it like being away from your family for so long?

Our every day details are every day challenges for students who are still learning the language—much less the slang. Have you ever thought about what it sounds like when you say things such as, "Cool!" Isn't that a gauge of temperature?


Jenny Brady, Director of Diversity

at PCA, knows what this feels like. Her missionary parents moved her to Honduras when she was in the seventh grade. Isn't Middle School hard enough without being in a foreign country? Mrs. Brady dealt with the adjustments to foreign culture and what it feels like to be the new and "different" student. "I remember I had some adults help me with my transition to Honduras, but it would have been so nice if I'd had the help of someone my own age," Mrs. Brady said. "Someone who could understand what I was facing every day."

Alathea Holt, Upper School Teacher, also experienced life as an international guest, but she was a teacher when she moved to Thailand to teach for a year. "As a foreigner in Thailand, I constantly needed help more than I was able to give or minister to the Thai people, which helped me to recognize the great power that comes through serving international students here in the United States," Alathea shared.

It was through Mrs. Brady and Mrs. Holt's own experiences that spurred the launch of the International Student Program (ISP) at Prestonwood Christian Academy. They realized the percentage of diverse students at PCA had grown over the past five years to nearly 20 percent, and there were more and more international students with needs that they understood. But the desire for Mrs. Brady and Mrs. Holt is for this program to eventually be 100 percent student-led with only faculty sponsors. "We know that the international students will receive more help from students who know the PCA process and culture," Mrs. Brady said. "Students connect with other students." There are student representatives for each grade 7-12. These are the students assisting the international students with their questions, concerns, and they also provide a tutoring program to help with writing an English paper as the international students often do not know appropriate sentence structure.

## ISP Program Goals:

- 1) Minister with the goal of salvation for all students, families and communities affected
- 2 Minister through helping students become better acquainted with the American and PCA culture.
- 3 Provide opportunities for mutual, cultural education between both the PCA faculty and students and the international students.
- 4) Equip the international students to be ministers in their own homes and international communities, thereby helping fulfill the Great Commission.

The goals of the ISP involve more than teaching the English language or where to find the grocery store. The ISP is ministering to these students with the intent of fulfilling the Great Commission. Many international students come to PCA looking for a cultural experience and leave experiencing the saving grace of Jesus Christ. That life change is taken back to their family and ultimately to their community; thus spreading the Truth to the corners of the earth. "A side affect of this ministry is that these students will return to their homes one day and will be able to 'influence their homes, churches and communities for Christ.' These students will reach people we wouldn't normally reach." stated Mrs. Brady.

Being a student isn't just about academic learning—it's also learning to have fun! ISP coordinates fun activities for international students and U.S. students so that they learn

the American culture. The students have had dinner parties (where two international students learned they live in the same neighborhood!), gone shopping, and even learned how to bowl! Junior Laura Hurd is one of many students who are serving as partners to the international students.

She said, "Participating in the ISP isn't a duty or a chore—I get to hang out with really great students and make new friends! It's such a blessing to be able to spend my time with such incredible people with interesting stories.'

## the making of a PCA play

The lights are dim. The audience quietly mummers as **PCABills** are passed out and ushers assist as seats are found. Behind the scenes, student actors ready themselves to take the stage while the student "black brigade" ensures that every prop and detail is in place. Then, it happens. The curtain parts in anticipation of another fall performance by PCA's Fine Arts department theatre students. Another outstanding student-led production ensues under the direction of PCA theatre instructor, Ms. Pam Hurt, and Fine Arts Director Joel T. Rutherford. The final bows are taken and the audience leaves entertained and in awe, but many don't know how it all happened. How it all came together. How the words of a script were transformed into a professionalquality play on the stage of the Eisemann Center through the use of God-given student talent, parental support and faculty instruction. If you've ever wondered how studentled productions could reach such heights of theatrical professionalism or thought it simply came easily, here's what happens in the making of a PCA play.

After Fine Arts faculty selects a play for performance in the fall, it's time for student work to begin. PCA theatre students are given the great opportunity by Ms. Hurt and Mr. Rutherford to learn the ins-and-outs of all aspects of theatre production through their participation. By the time a theatre student who is interested in pursuing a career in theatre leaves PCA, they have had the chance to be a part of all elements of a production.

In early fall, students audition in an open casting call, receive callbacks and a student cast and crew of almost 75 is assembled. Actors begin learning lines, gaining direction into their character and performance during the weeks of nearly daily rehearsals after school and on weekends that lead up to the November performance.



"Our students take their roles on stage very seriously," said Mr. Rutherford. "There is a great and growing tradition of excellence in this area of our Fine Arts program, and with each year that passes, the students feel the weight of carrying on that very proud tradition of excellence."

The design of the play's set is determined and is constructed off-site by hours of student-actor manpower and then transported piece-by-piece by students into place at the theatre. All actors participate in set construction.

The important technical aspects such as lighting and audio are considered and finalized. Student publicity teams take on promotion art for the play poster and **PCABill** ad sales in order to elevate awareness and promote ticket sales. Parents are mobilized to assist students in being successful by helping Ms. Hurt oversee food service for every rehearsal and performance, PCABill production and other behind-the-scenes needs such as show costume quick-changes or obtaining props.

The all-important student "black brigade" team, as they are known because of their work on and off stage to pull off a play, readies for every behind-the-scenes detail to ensure that the actors have what is needed during every act, every scene. Additionally, students get busy planning and designing costumes, makeup and hair for the actors based on character interpretation under the direction of faculty and parents.

Some PCA productions, such as William Shakespeare's "Romeo + Juliet," require a unique set of acting skills, such as theatre combat. Theatre combat enables actors to portray confrontational physical scenes necessary to the play's storyline without actually causing actors to be hurt. Under the direction of PCA's Technical Director Stewart Stevens, who is professionally certified in many variations "Additionally, God has uniquely blessed of combat theatre, student-actors have the opportunity to learn how to correctly act out fighting and contentious physical scenes safely, while appearing real to the audience. Theatre combat is unique and professional training in this type of theatre technique is distinctive to PCA productions, when it is integral to making the story real to the audience.

"Theatre combat is very important for a play like this year's 'Romeo + Juliet' and we are blessed to have Stewart Stevens on staff and assisting with combat choreography for this production," said Mr. Rutherford. "Stewart has extensive training and certifications in this area of theatre."

This year, we ended up with a number of kids interested in some of the behind-the-scenes elements of show production." said Mr. Rutherford. "It's wonderful for us to get to work with these kids in this way and it gives them this great opportunity to own major aspects of the production. We are trying to grow this area of our program."


PCA with a gifted director in Pam Hurt," said Mr. Rutherford. "She is gifted in many ways and has a great vision when it comes to putting a show together. Equally important is her ability to relate to students and volunteers. She imparts life skills to these kids that they will take with them for years to come."

Once the lights fade to black and the audience exits the theatre, PCA students then begin removing the set, recycling what can be reused and trashing the remainder. Students return all costumes and props neatly back to the PCA theatre room to serve another actor. another audience, another day.

It's all what goes into the making of a PCA play.

#### **Bullying from a Biblical Perspective**

There is always one in a crowd – a bully. A person who, for a time, is bigger, stronger, smarter, or richer than others and who uses that particular strength not merely to their own advantage, but also to the detriment of others. The Bible gives great insight into the concept of strength and power and how that tool is to be used by those who possess it. Scripture is filled with examples of those who misused their God-given talents: Goliath misused this strength; the rich fool in Luke 12 misused his wealth. There are also examples of those who used their talents wisely: the parable of the Good Samaritan who used his wealth to provide for the downtrodden; Samson used his strength to fight evil and protect God's people; and Joshua used his insight to provide for others in a time of great need and famine.

Of course the greatest example is Jesus himself – who used his strength to protect the innocent, his power to battle evil, his life to destroy death. Romans 15:1 reminds us that "we who are strong ought to bear with the failings of the weak." Psalm 41 says, "Blessed is he who has regard for the weak." If you have strength, use it to protect the weak and the innocent; if wealth, use it to provide for those in need; if power, use it to fight against injustice.

God gives us strength to use for His glory. For further discussion: read about David's Mighty Men (2 Samuel 23) or from author Irene Howat's outstanding series *Ten Boys Who Made a Difference* (there are books for girls, too).

The love story of young Bella Swan with the forever 17-year-old vampire Edward Cullen has captured the imagination of this generation. The four books of the *Twilight* series coupled with two blockbuster movies have pushed sales into the hundreds of millions of dollars making this a hard story to ignore. So what's all the fuss about?

I believe that our culture is hungry for this passionate love story because they see so little of genuine love today – and that is only to our shame and dismay. Edward Cullen is a faint reflection of history's greatest lover, Jesus Christ, who removes from his own our heart of stone and

replaces it with a heart of flesh (Ezekiel 36:26), just the opposite of what Edward offers to Bella! But the results are the same – without our true love, we are dead, lost, miserable. Bella found her true identity in the love of Edward – and we find our true selves in the love of Christ.



RAISING UP TOMORROW'S LEADERS IN THE MARKETPLACE. While it may be difficult for a Lower School parent to easily imagine the day when their student will graduate from PCA, enter college, and eventually the marketplace, PCA students exit PCA as prepared and

In 2008-09, PCA students received college acceptances from more than 150 colleges and universities, including four lvy League acceptances. Nearly 100 percent of all PCA students have matriculated to more than 130 major colleges and universities. More than \$12 million dollars in scholarships has been awarded to PCA graduates in the past three years. PCA's intentional academic program contributed to these successes.

"I recently met with a group of PCA alumni who are currently walking the halls of major universities in the Northeast and they were consistently telling me how prepared PCA had made them for college," said Head of School Larry Taylor. "They tell me they are able to out-perform many of their peers due to the academic rigor they received at PCA."

PCA alumni stretch the globe as they use their PCA education to touch others in the marketplace with their minds and their Christ-like character. "What I learned in and out of the classroom I applied each and every day at college from conversations I had with others, to often feeling slightly ahead of my peers in understanding many subjects," said Liz Allbright, Texas A&M graduate and PCA '05.

**SUMMING IT ALL UP.** Everything that happens in a PCA classroom is summed up by the words of the mission statement to "strive for academic excellence." It's that determination to make academic success attainable for all students that drive the best faculty in the country to help students excel.
